Meeting Minutes

SMQG General Meeting, Wednesday, May 1, 2018

The meeting was called to order at 7:15pm.

A new member, Emily Watts, introduced herself.

There were no guests.

Maureen talked about the party for Kathryn Small on June 2, and asked members to sign up to bring refreshments, and to help set up.

A motion was made to approve the minutes of the last meeting. Jenny Kraft made the motion, and Mary Lloyd seconded the motion. The motion was passed.

A motion was made to approve the Treasurer's report as given in the newsletter. The motion was approved by voice vote.

Kennalee received a round of applause for her work on the fabric sale at Meet the Teachers. Approximately 1,000 yards of fabric were sold, which raised \$3,000.

Olivia talked about this evening's donations, and said she put them out on the table for anyone to take. She plans to do this exchange three times a year. The next time will be in August.

Allison said that the guild now has 62 members. She also said that a revision to the directory would be

emailed soon with corrections to some email messages.

Ways and Means didn't have a sale due to the exchange planned by Olivia. Keiko said that she brought homemade strawberry jam for the raffle prizes.

Philanthropy asked everyone to clean out their closets and donate clothes for interviews. Shoes are accepted, and men's clothes too.

Hospitality was thanked for organizing refreshments.

Sue Barrett talked about upcoming programs. She gave out 40 surveys, and received 11 back with 2 more by email, which was a high rate of return. She is reviewing the surveys to plan the calendar.

In June, we will have a trunk show of our president, Maureen Gardner's work.

For July there will be no meeting due to the July 4 holiday. There will not be a potluck dinner this summer.

August will be Linda Sullivan from Colorwerx. Sue would like to do a half-day afternoon class before the August meeting. Linda offers a class called "Mod Dog" that is half-day, and is an appliqué technique. Please note that we will be in the Fireside Room at the church for this meeting.

September will be Lyn Mann, and there will probably be a workshop.

October will be Jean Impey, who will talk about "Finding Our Passion".

For Show and Tell, Jenny Kraft shared a charity quilt called "Bath Time". It is a donation for a fundraiser for the Quest camp in Northern California. It's a safari camp where everyone sleeps in tents, and kids get to feed the elephants.

Mariana shared an appliqué quilt. She also shared 2 quilts made of strips, one green and the other blue.

Kennalee shared a completed UFO with yellow chain blocks she started 13 years ago.

Lani shared a UFO quilt with fat quarters from Hawaii. She started it in 2012, and finished it at the retreat.

Alison shared a blue and pink UFO that she began years ago. It was a mystery quilt so she had no idea that it would turn out to be so big.

There was a break at 7:40pm, and then Keiko announced the raffle prize winners.

Frances Moore gave a trunk show of quilts she has made over the years. She teaches free-motion quilting, so she also showed excellent long-arm quilting.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40pm.

A native Angeleno, Kate Small was born one hundred years ago in the City of Angels and spent most of her life here. She did leave to get her Bachelor's degree at Berkeley and then to Kentucky, to marry her fiancé, Ted Small, as he was about to head out to serve as a fighter pilot during World War II.

Over the years, Kathryn raised three children, helped Ted create a haute couture women's clothing business under the name of Edith Small, and became active in many community organizations. She also followed her creative instincts and learned many crafts, one of which led her to the most satisfying – quilting.

One day in the 1980s, on her way home from a welding class (yes, welding), where she created artworks with a blowtorch - Kate stopped at a donut shop in Santa Monica. She spotted a shop nearby with a sign overhead that read "Crazy Ladies and Friends." Her curiosity led her to what became her passion for the rest of her life. It was a quilt store, owned by an inspirational teacher and author, Mary Ellen Hopkins. Within 2 days of her first class, Kate had a quilt top done and she was on her way. Blow torch gone, sewing machine front and center!

In the fifteen years she worked at and hung out at the store, she developed a very distinctive style of putting fabrics together that others would not have tried. She is known for using unusual fabrics in unusual ways. When Mary Ellen would order a print that everyone would gasp in horror at, Kate would smile, take it home and bring it back a few days later in a finished quilt top which was fantastic! Needless to say, the fabric flew out of the store as others dared to use it. This was Kate's intended plan, after all.

Her quiet wit and creative mind have kept her active and productive all these years. Besides quilting, she still does the Sunday New York Times crossword puzzle – in ink!

Kate's quilts can be seen in several of Mary Ellen's books (particularly "Log Cabin Notebook" available from Amazon) and in a new photographic book of her entire collection created by her son-in-law, artist David Em (www.davidem.com).
