Dora Cary is our speaker for August. Dora was originally booked to speak with us in person in April 2020. We all know what happened with that! Dora will share some of her history and quilts and I'm certain she'll tell us all about her new quilt shop in Paso Robles. Road trip anyone?

From her website . . . . Orange Dot Quilts was created in 2016 by me, Dora Cary, a Romanian-born engineer and designer who moved to the United States in 2001, discovered quilting in 2006, made my first quilt and became an American citizen in 2008, and wrote my first quilt pattern in 2013.

Now I have more than 30 quilt and bag patterns and even more patterns are waiting to be created. I have several notebooks filled with ideas and sketches waiting to be turned into quilts, bags, or something else altogether.

I love quilting for the creativity and freedom of expression it gives me, and I love the quilting community for the amazing generosity and sense of camaraderie.

Why Orange Dot Quilts, you ask? Because I love orange and polka dots and quilts. Because ORANGE, DOTs, and QUILTS make me happy.

My lectures are fun and informative, covering the unusual path I took from growing up in communist Romania to having a successful quilting business in the country of my dreams. During my lectures I share my quilts, my favorite quilting techniques and tools, as well as my no-basting method of quilting on a domestic sewing machine.

## Vice President

SCCQG Rep News – I and some other SMQG members attended the Council meeting in July. The topic centered around the ins and outs of Volunteerism in the guild. Some of the subtopics were: why we volunteer; how to collect and encourage volunteers; and once you get them how to keep them. My takeaway from the discussions both in the break-out rooms and in general were as follows:

- 1. We volunteer out of some sense of duty to give back to the guild. The guild itself provides us with many creative, social, and educational opportunities. So, it is only fitting that we should give back to the guild by volunteering to do something to keep it functioning.
- 2. Once you have decided to volunteer, realize that you don't have to work alone. The guild, by

definition, is a collaborative effort to keep the timehonored tradition of quilting alive. Share the load. Divide up the tasks and directly ask members for help. Some people will help if directly approached.

- 3. Know your guild. Form a year-long committee to investigate what members did in a previous work life and try to match them with Guild jobs which might correspond.
- 4. Be kind. One of the comments that came up was that the same people were on the board for years and years and weren't willing to step down and let new members take over. Invite new members to attend Board meetings to experience how friendly and welcoming the Board is. Be open to changing up the Board.

Next SCCQG meeting is scheduled for October via Zoom. Details to follow in the next newsletter.

LONE ROBINS: Because we are still Zooming our meetings, we are going to add an Element 5 to the Lone Robin Challenge with the final Element to be given in September for an October Reveal.

If you would like to participate, see below for details to catch up. All you have to do is start! We are on Element 5.

To start: Select a base (an unused block or a chunk of fabric or some leftover piece of a quilt)

Element 1. Add a curve or a circle of some kind. Can be appliqued, pieced, embroidered...

Element 2. Add some flying geese of any size and/or number.

Element 3. The third element must include strips or stripes. You could piece your stripes or use a stripey fabric. They can be straight or wavy, chunky or pencil thin. The stripes can be evenly distributed or just appear in a few small areas. The possibilities are endless. Good luck Lone Robins!

Element 4. The fourth element must include squares. You cannot use your whole quilt as the square. You have to visually add a square.

Element 5: Your fifth element must include crosses or Xs. They can be regular or wonky! This could be the moment where you cut your entire piece into quarters and put a cross through the middle of it. Or maybe you'll make some minature "x" blocks and scatter them in the corners of your quilt. You could combine crosses with another motif of your choosing. It is your choice Lone Robins! "Make it work."

## Notes From the Field

#### PATTY KENNEDY-ZAFRED'S QUILTS

Patty Kennedy-Zafred uses historical photos to raise issues of social justice. She prefers the silk screen process to transfer photos onto fabric, often using feed sacks as the background layer. The images are often repeated across the quilt top for more impact. In addition, she has won numerous awards throughout her career, as shown in the gallery on <a href="Patty-Kennedy-Zafred's website">Patty Kennedy-Zafred's website.</a>

Here's a link to watch Patty Kennedy-Zafred interviewed by Lisa Walton as she demonstrates silk screen and shibori dyeing methods. Details of the dyeing process are described on this handout: Shibori Immersion Dyeing from Quilting Arts TV.

Kennedy-Zafred's quilt that affected me the most is called Tagged, and it shows Japanese Americans on their way to internment camps during World War II after <a href="Executive Order 9066">Executive Order 9066</a> was issued. These tagged children were among the approximately 30,000 young children whose childhoods were spent in the camps. Watch as <a href="Kennedy-Zafred talks about the "Tagged">Kennedy-Zafred talks about the "Tagged"</a> quilt.

In high school, I read <u>Farewell to Manzanar</u>, which described the horrifying conditions of life in the internment camp (ironically located near Independence, California). The location was freezing in winter and broiling in the summer. At meals, families were separated by age, breaking close family bonds. Many cars travel by the camp site on the way to Mammoth Mountain without understanding the full story. Here's a link to the National Park Service <u>Manzanar website</u>.

Both Ansel Adams and Dorothea Lange were allowed access into Manzanar to take photos. Here is a link to <u>Ansel Adams photos of Manzanar</u>. Some of Dorothea Lange's photos were censored as described in <u>Dorothea Lange photos of Manzanar</u>.

Women living at Manzanar sewed to keep busy since they were not allowed to work outside the camp. Here is an image of women <u>Sewing at Manzanar</u> and an image of a <u>Dressmaking class at Manzanar</u>.

The corner of Lincoln and Venice Boulevards in Venice was a local collection point for transit to the Manzanar camp. Today the Venice Japanese American Memorial Monument marks this corner. The photo at the top of the website shows these citizens lining up for their bus trip to the desolation of the Owens Valley.

I used to drive by the VJAMM on my way to and from work in Marina del Rey. One morning I noticed that the stone marker had been defaced with white paint. I contacted VJAMM immediately and I was relieved that they were able to remove the paint without damage to the obelisk.

This <u>Common Ground exhibit at the Japanese</u>
<u>American National Museum</u> describes the Japanese
American men who volunteered to fight for the USA in
World War II – while their families were living under
24-hour guard in the camps. The suitcases are
reminders that these citizens were only allowed to
carry one suitcase into the camps.

The museum shop offers Folkwear <u>Japanese</u> <u>clothing patterns</u>, along with art, books and videos about the internment experience.

Quilters made millions of masks to combat the global COVID-19 pandemic. As I watch nations competing peacefully at the Olympics, let us all give to others the compassion and understanding we wish for ourselves.
