Remembering Veronica Gray

Veronica Gray was a long-time member of the Santa Monica Quilt Guild. She served on the board in many ways: President, 2005-07, 2008-09, Vice President 2007-08, Membership 2002-03, Recording Secretary 2019-23, and on Publicity 2004-05. She also served on and often led several nominating committees. She was also a founding member of Westside Quilters. Yes, she was a very giving person with her time and very smart and kind to friends and family.

She grew up in Indio, CA, the eldest of a large farming family with six siblings. She was the ideal big sister to her younger sisters and brothers. She worked for the Catholic diocese and later at St Monica's before she

It doesn't seem possible that this is the last SMQG newsletter of 2023. I am always surprised at how fast the days go by after Labor Day. Hope everyone's Thanksgiving was bountiful and you came home with leftovers.

Since our January Sew-In meeting will focus on completing some of Veronica's Disappearing 9 Patch UFOs, I am including information I have found that clarifies what a Disappearing 9-Patch is, and how to make the block.

First, in order to make a 9 patch disappear, you have to create a 9-patch block! It's easy to use 5" squares, but other sizes work too. I found two internet sites that can help, and there are more. At quiltfabrication.com, "Efficiently Sewing a 9-patch". You will find a very good description and good photos of chain piecing the patches together to make a 9 patch block. There is also a bonus link to a Disappearing 9-patch tutorial for a quilt. A You Tube Video: Chain Piecing with Ashley Nickels, Michael's Creative Bug, shows the chain piecing process very clearly.

Second, to understand what you're doing when you turn your 9-patch block into a Disappearing 9-patch, go to ShadywoodQuilts.com. In the right column, click on Read More under Quilting for Beginners, and click on Disappearing Nine Patch (DNP) in the 3rd column on that next page. There is a clear graphic of exactly what will happen when you slice up your 9 patch block. Keep in mind, the corner blocks are untouched, the middle blocks are cut in half and become "sashing", and the center block is quartered and becomes "cornerstones" or "accents".

Now you know how to make the block, and maybe are thinking of fabric to use. If you want to follow an

exact pattern, go back to the one offered at quiltfabrication.com.

Hope this info helps a bit. Happy December Holidays and Happy 2024.



Disappearing Nine Patch

Written by Donna Jordan for Jordan Fabrics Finished Size: 63 x 89"



Fabric Requirements:

96 – 5" Charm Squares

Dark accent – ½ yard cut to 24@5" square

Light accent - 2 yards – cut to 96@5" square

Inner border - 5/8 yard – cut 7@ 2 ½" WOF


Outer border - 1 yard – cut 8@4" WOF

Binding - 5/8 yard


Backing – 5 ½ yards

Lay out the squares into a Nine patch block (see diagram below) putting the accent print in the center. Stitch the squares together using a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance. Iron the seam allowances flat. Repeat until you have a total of 24 blocks.

Take one of the ironed Nine Patch blocks and place it on your cutting board. Place your plastic ruler exactly along the horizontal center line and cut with a rotary cutter. Now place the plastic ruler exactly along the vertical center line and cut again.



Turn the blocks to match the diagram below and stitch back together.



Repeat with all the remaining blocks. Lay out the 24 blocks into a 4x6 block quilt top as shown in the picture of the finished quilt (all the blocks are oriented the same way). Stitch the blocks into rows and stitch the rows together.

Stitch the inner border onto all 4 sides of the quilt, then repeat with the outer border.

Quilt, bind, and enjoy!
