Welcome to the Chinese New Year. It's also a way to say Happy New Year in February. I'm always a bit late with Christmas cards too.

I just had a few nice days at the Road to California Quilt Show and saw all of the show—quilts and vendors. I started at the preview night which is always fun and less crowded, then spent a full day plus an extra hour. I had to stop due to exhaustion and still had to face the drive home—I took a break then, too, as I was too tired.

As always there were many impressive quilts. One of the times I went to a juried show, the artistry was so high and impressive, I wanted to quit quilting as I would never achieve anything like the show quilts. I am still impressed but know I work on a much less ambitious level. Have you heard of "micro-quilting", a form contrary to my "art". A wall quilt of about 8x10 inches might contain thousands of pieces with seams bigger than the finished side. You don't need much fabric but must have to work with tweezers. My eyes are probably past the stage that I can try this method.

There were more vendors this year than last—better shopping. Besides the full and half day classes there were some one hour classes on handwork, threads and a clover tool talk. Good to check out the list of classes that will come out this summer to ensure you take it. Plan now to show a quilt in the 2024 SCCQG exhibit.

My big moment was when I was looking at the Caryl Bryer Fallert Gentry quilts and had my picture taken with her. Maybe I can show it at the meeting Show and Tell.

The quarterly SCCQG meeting was in January. The speaker for this meeting was Karyn Payzant.

She is a social media consultant who worked with Road to California for a number of years. She became familiar with the quilting world at that time. She gave us many tips on how to use different social media platforms such as Instagram, Facebook, You tube and TikTok to promote our Guilds. They can be used for posting photos of our work but also can be used to teach and entice folks to check out our websites or meetings or guild happenings. In her words "educate, entertain, engage, build relationships, and to increase our visibility. Many good ideas which I think our social media person (Emily)is up to date on. Some of the suggestions will take some additional effort (educational videos) if we want to do that.

I have been without my larger at home Bernina for a number of months as it was having a power issue. I was able to pick it up today and also check out the newly re-opened for in store shopping, Sewing Arts Center. The report on SAC - if you haven't yet been is that it is huge!! A large amount of fabric – quilting cotton, batiks, and other fabrics as well, quilting, bags and clothing patterns, embroidery kits/thread, Bernina sewing machines, books, tons of notions, rulers and other quilty gadgets. It's a little overwhelming. The classroom is very spacious. I did enjoy a collection of old sewing machines and a few toy ones too. FYI masks are required. Bolt ends are now not in a roll but on something they call a "half/baby bolt". The cardboard of the bolt is cut in half and the fabric is wrapped around that SAC will fulfill all your guilty needs. I'm sure I haven't listed everything that is available.

PS: my machine is working great and I'm happy I can quilt my larger quilts more easily now.

Philanthropy

This year the guild has decided to donate our philanthropy quilts to local organizations. We have found three different groups in Santa Monica who will be very happy to receive as many quilts as we can give.

Venice Family Clinic. They have a prenatal health education program for all mothers-to-be and their families who come through the clinic. These are low income families and the clinic would like baby quilts for the newborns as well as adult-sized quilts for the mothers and fathers.

People Concern. They are associated with Santa Monica's Homeless Shelter. They run a drop-in access center for the homeless. They give out blankets to people who come by and need one but these blankets

are army cot style- grey and scratchy. They would much prefer to pass out soft, handmade, cheerful quilts to the homeless. They need twin size or larger quilts.

Santa Monica First United Methodist Church (you can't get any more local than that). They have a prayer quilt ministry that makes and gives out quilts to those who ask for special prayers because they are suffering through difficult times such as illness or extreme hardship. The church asks for only quilt tops because they tie on their own quilt backs signed with prayers from the congregation. They have specific size requirements: No larger than 45" by 60" and no smaller than 40" by 50". Since these are not large quilts, it would be an excellent way to finally clean out all those orphan blocks that tend to hang around for too long. Also, the church was donated a lot of strip fabrics to be used for prayer quilts, so if anyone would like to work on a quick quilt top during our March inperson philanthropy-quilt-making meeting we can ask to use those strip fabrics.

Regarding our philanthropy food donations, the Board has thought to do something different this year. We are extending a challenge to our members. A dollar-for-dollar match! For every dollar that is donated by you, the guild will match the accumulated donations up to \$200.00 and give the money to the Westside Food Bank. If the member donations exceed \$200, we can discuss increasing our matching funds amount. What a great way to make your donation go twice as far. Since we are having fewer in-person meetings now, it is more difficult to physically collect canned food. This is a much easier way to continue to support the food bank.

How do you make your donation? Make your check payable to the Westside Food Bank and send it to Kennalee Mattson, guild treasurer (2329 Boone Avenue, Venice, CA 90291). We will include your amount in our matching funds and send all checks to the LA Food bank when we send our check.

Thank you to all our many generous members who are always thinking of others and are so giving of your time, talents, skills and resources. I am very appreciative of you all.

January 4, 2023
