Our speaker for June is Trudy Cleveland. Trudy is both a professional quilter and professional photographer. She has been sewing since she was 12 years old and quilting for 20 years. Since becoming a professional longarmer she found the need to photograph customer's quilts to keep a record of her journey. And so began her interest in the art of photographing quilts. Her quilts have been accepted to the International Quilt Festival in Houston, Road to California and numerous other exhibitions. She has spoken extensively throughout the United States and her presentations are both educational and entertaining.

Her presentation is titled "Shoot Your Quilt". Trudy describes her talk, saying:
"Shoot Your Quilt" is a program that describes why you should take photographs of
your quilts and how to photograph them to get professional results, using only your smartphone.

Trudy will give practical tips that you will be able to use immediately with your smartphone."I didn't know I could do that" is a frequent comment at the end of this presentation!" Have your smartphone handy during the presentation so you can put your newfound knowledge into operation right away!

Our July meeting will be a potluck and very special show and tell. Our show and tell for July is titled: "How it Started, How It's Going". We are asking members to bring 2 quilts to share with the group. One example of your early work and one example of your recent work. Reporter on the street this month. I went to an amazing exhibit of dresses designed by a Chinese woman, Guo Pai. Her studio, Rose Studio" is based in Beijing. She employs 500 people at 3 other locations outside of Beijing. Most of them start without experience and learn on the job. She designs dresses, hats, and shoes and they are considered Haute Couture. Rhianna wore one of her creations to the Met Gala 2015, which brought Pei to Western attention. This garment weighed 55 pounds when complete. Rhianna needed 3 attendants to help her with the train.

Many of her designs are unusual, the Chinese influence is evident. Many of the garments are heavily embroidered and embellished with beads, crystals, feathers, semiprecious stones. She designs the shoes and hats to enhance each of the outfits. Gou Pei's parents did not encourage her in her garment designing endeavors though she did learn to sew from her mother, mostly uniforms during the Mao regime. She was able to study and graduate with a degree in fashion design initially working at the first privately owned clothing brand in China before branching out on her own.

Though not quilting related, I appreciated the workmanship and skill in designing the garments on exhibit. Unfortunately, the exhibit has ended, but there is a documentary on Gou Pei that sounds very interesting. It is called "Yellow is Forbidden". I plan to watch this sometime soon though I don't plan on wearing any of the dresses!

There is an exhibit at the Fowler Museum at UCLA of Armenian loops and knotting right now, as well as an exhibit of work by Myrlande Constant. She is an Haitian artist who works with textiles, stitchery and beads. I plan to check those out too.
