President's Corner

I hope our members have all begun their STASH organizing under the influence of our August speaker, Carol Wilhoit, who had an impressive collection. We had a previous speaker who said she didn't have a stash, pause for shock, she had a STABLE, stash beyond life expectancy.

Quilters have no need of guilt for their collection, be it STASH or STABLE. During the early pandemic, 2020 when we started making mystery quilts, we couldn't go shopping yet managed to make nice quilts with fabric on hand. That's the value of a collection. I found I could use my stash, make quilts, and not shop. Some smart quilters may have gone online to get the "right fabric" but maybe bought just enough for the project. In my past I have shopped for a border fabric and later I changed my mind and chose another. Well, there are no returns on cut fabric so into the stash it goes.

Along the path to quilting I took a class taught by Piecemakers, Orange County, to make braided rugs. The first ones were of cotton and made me slightly crazy. I had some fabric given to me and started asking for more. I tore sheets up and shopped at the F & S remnant barrel, not wanting to pay more than a \$1/yd. A modest 3 x 4-foot rug could use up 25 yards. Yardage was better than fat quarters as 3 ½ "strips are used. That early rug is more than 33 years old and has worn through in places, but the holes reveal new fabric under the holes. I stand on it every day at the kitchen sink and the slight worn look is OK for this utility rug. Fortuitously, I used some poly blends and the color (red and blue) of those has held up among the other faded cottons. The braid is laced between strands so there is little wear on the structure the way commercial rugs that are topstitched together.

I made a few other cotton rugs then a braided wool rug. So, I started collecting dress weight wool yardage and clothes that could be used (pants and skirts but not shirts). I finished one that is still in use, maybe 5 x 6' but have another one I should just declare finished so I can start another one. Wool makes a wider braid so the rug goes a bit faster than cotton and has more cushion.

I think sorting out the stash can happen next month. If you are ready to move fabric out, there is a nonprofit in Pasadena www.remaindersspa.org that can take fabric and tools for their classes. Some of you may know of LA Goal in Culver City that can also use fabric for their classes. And at our in-person meeting, we will have our FREE table. Remember we are still making placemats for local Meals on Wheels. Those orphan blocks and unfinished class blocks can make nice placemats.

I am sorry to say that due to a family memorial the day after the guild meeting, I will miss this in person meeting. I hate to miss the meeting but have reliable board members to help run the meeting.
